At the meeting, I was the lone dissenter on closing Recommendation 14-1 for several reasons: (1) the intent of the Recommendation was not met; (2) the IP was not completed; and (3) I believe this sends the wrong signal to the Department that we are willing to close a Recommendation without its purpose being satisfied and prior to having a previously-scheduled hearing to discuss significant issues that still remain. The Secretary of Energy is required by the Atomic Energy Act to carry out and complete the implementation plan. While the Act does not explicitly assign the Safety Board a role in approving or monitoring progress for an implementation plan, the Secretary of Energy is required to provide the plan to the Board, and the Board, pursuant to its normal oversight authority, may examine any progress by the Secretary in providing reasonable assurance of adequate protection.

Given that I was in the minority on this vote, I do support a communication with the Secretary of Energy that I hope will encourage him to review the original recommendation with his staff—some of who are new to the Department—and follow through to address the concerns raised within that Recommendation. Ultimately, it is the responsibility of the Secretary of Energy to provide the adequate protection of public health and safety at defense nuclear facilities in his role as operator and regulator.

The status of the Emergency Preparedness and Response capabilities at defense nuclear facilities represent the last line of defense for protection of the public and systemic issues in execution and oversight of these functions need to be addressed.
